'You are not Alone' which focused on serving the community in border villages who were suffering from the heat of the brutal war, was carried out as a signature community service project in the Rotaract Year 1999/2000. The project was able to win the 'Best Community Service Project – South Asia Region – 1999/2000 since the project truly impacted society by showing the importance of peace to the world.

'Handz' which was initiated in 2008, brought a new concept for the community service avenue of the club by overtaking the common boundaries of donating materials to people in need. The project focused on the empowerment of the underprivileged communities in North Central province in sustainable means.

The dream project of the club, 'Grama Prabodaya' was initiated in 2016 serving the underprivileged community in Ranugalla, Monaragala by hosting a series of sub-projects as the 1st chapter. The project focused on the economic and community development of a selected area on a massive scale. The 2nd chapter was launched in Hambegamuwa, Monragala in 2018 and the 3rd chapter was launched in Nochchiyagama, Anuradapura. 'Rotaract Outstanding Project Awards - International Single Club Winner – 2017' award was awarded to Grama Prabodaya by Rotary International considering the influence it had on the society.

'Zooxanthellae' was a project which has an impact on the world which would last for more than a thousand years. After having several surveys on the field, Rotaract Club of University of Moratuwa deposited steel structures, which make houses for new corals in the coastline of Rumassala. The project received Rotaract Outstanding Project Awards - South Asia Regional Winner award in 2019 for its beneficial impact on the environment.

As Rotaract in Sri Lanka proudly celebrates its 50 years of service and Rotaract Club of University of Moratuwa celebrates its 25th anniversary, we decided to showcase the award-winning projects to reminisce this momentous journey and inspire sustainable initiatives to serve the communities across the globe.



A glimpse of the past



Sponsored by the Rotary Club of Colombo West, it was founded with just 16 members in 1995 with the intention of utilizing the young intelligent minds in experimenting and inventing modern creations for the betterment of the community and themselves. Rotaract Club of University of Moratuwa, also known as Rotaract Mora, was thus welcomed to the dynamic Rotaract family, to be a party to serve the community forever and beyond. Today, the club has more than 250 Rotaractors in it, who are interested in volunteerism and it's truly overwhelming how the club has gradually grown into what it is today, as we are forever in debt of the past members and the board of officials of the club, who have done an immense contribution towards achieving the glory and reputation that we have today.

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YOU ARE NOT ALONE (1999)

Best Rotaract Community Service Project - South Asia Region –1999/2000

Just four years after its inauguration in 1995 as the first university based Rotaract Club in Sri Lanka, Rotaract Club of University of Moratuwa was already at full steam and rapidly gaining momentum to become one of the most prestigious service clubs in the region. Having just won its first District Awards as Best Professional Development Project for "Are You Ready?" and Best President, the Rotaractors were up for a greater challenge in the Community Service avenue.

As a result of certain unfortunate circumstances, the late 90's shall ever be remembered as a period of gloom in the history of our motherland. The Civil War that had been raging for two decades had claimed countless lives, property and assets. People, having lost their homes, were suffering as refugees in camps without adequate rations and other necessities. Thus the need was dire that these refugees be taken care of and that mutual understanding was reached between the people of the country.

In this context, Rotaract Mora took timely action and launched "You Are Not Alone" to reach out to those displaced by the war. The Rotaractors reached out to the affected areas and took initiatives to distribute proper clothing, food and other essentials to the refugees. To reflect the theme of the project, a peace exhibition was also held and the children were given books.

This project was able to furnish the Rotaractors at Rotaract Mora with an opportunity to feel the real contentment of social effort while fueling up the innocent souls by effectively communicating the message that 'They are not alone'. Strengthening the bond between the nationalities and religions was also facilitated by the project, introducing a platform where many social relationships were built upon. Due to the timely nature and success of the project, it was subsequently recognized as the Best Rotaract Community Service Project of the South Asia Region.

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HANDZ (2008-2011)

Rotaract Outstanding Project Awards - South Asia Winner – 2010/2011



For many years, the term "community service" was associated with making material donations to people in need. But truly serving a community entails so much more than providing temporary solutions to the issues faced by them on a daily basis. In hopes of redefining the manner of action attributed to the expression, Rotaract Club of University of Moratuwa launched 'HandZ', a community service project with a different twist. Through this project, our Rotaractors resorted to a more sustainable and innovative approach of

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driving underprivileged communities towards development by empowering their people. Thus, through the said empowerment, these people were to be provided the means to be able to develop their localities, by themselves, in the long run.

Initiated in 2008, the project mainly focused on harvesting the knowledge of the students of University of Moratuwa, the leading technical hub of Sri Lanka, in promoting the mediocre living standards of rural villages while specially imparting wisdom on the younger generations of such areas so that they may take over the reins of developing their localities themselves in the future.





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The project was implemented in Anuradhapura and Polonnaruwa of Sri Lanka's North Central Province. The North Central Province is the largest province in the country in terms of area and home to a population of agriculture-based communities with low average income levels and minimum educational facilities.

Following is a synopsis of the wide array of programs and activities carried out over the years under this mammoth project.

- -Mathematics and Science seminars for the benefit of students facing their G.C.E. Ordinary Level examinations, having limited or no access to tutoring and whose schools, at times, lack sufficient staff.
- -Workshops on Information and Communication Technology for students and novice monks with limited exposure to using computers and in the subject in general.

-English language proficiency workshops for students.

-Leadership and personality development programs for students.

-Book donations to schools with below par library facilities.

-Gifting laptops to students admitted to state universities.

-Counselling sessions for students and school leavers with family issues.

-Vaccination programs for students.

-Providing drinking water and sanitary facilities to public spaces of certain villages.

'HandZ' was able to secure the award for "Outstanding Rotaract Project – South Asia" by the Rotary International during its running for the scale of work undertaken by the project.



GRAMA PRABODHAYA

Rotaract Outstanding Project Awards - International Single Club Winner – 2016/2017



The core concept of the project 'Grama Prabodhaya' rallies around supporting rural villages in Sri Lanka which lack acceptable living standards and are in dire need of help, and developing them into self-sustaining units so as to uplift the quality of life of the villagers. The project was initiated back in July of 2016.

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Each annual chapter of 'Grama Prabodhaya' focuses on developing a particular village or area of the island chosen after carrying out heavy research and site visits to underprivileged villages in the country and gaining thorough insight into the issues prevailing in each area. Following the final selection, a lineup of sub projects that is customized to address key problems in the area is decided upon by the project committee.

'Grama Prabodhaya' for the years 2016/17 and 2017/18 was based in the village of Ranugalla, Monaragala. The 'Intellect' and 'Inspirer' sub projects were introduced to the project lineup under which Maths, Science English seminars and were conducted for the benefit of O/L students in the locality. The construction of a science laboratory and computer lab, and the initiation of a new library at Mo/ Ranugalla Kanishta Vidyalaya were some key milestones in the project's implementation at Ranugalla.



A number of leadership development camps, sports coaching programs, art and literary competitions, and science practical demonstration programs were carried out for students of the school under this project instalment in hopes of uplifting the education in the area and motivating students to work towards better life prospects. Additionally, 'Healing Hands', the annual health camp of the club was also conducted at Ranugalla in the respective years for the benefit of residents in the area.

During the Rotaract year 2018/19, 'Grama Prabodhaya' was implemented in the village of Hambegamuwa, Udawalawa. In addition to carrying out the usual 'Intellect' and 'Inspirer' programs and a leadership training program for students of Hambegamuwa Janapada Kanishta Vidyalaya, the project specially focused on addressing the issue of health in the area by organizing another instalment of the 'Healing Hands' health camp and 'Senehe Yathra', a program gifting pregnant mothers in the locality with essential goods and baby care products. Additionally,the sub project 'Arunaloka' was implemented to improve the facilities of the Siri Sumana Dhamma School in Thanamalvila.



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The most recent chapter of 'Grama Prabodhaya', for the year 2019/20, unraveled in the village of Dunupothagama, Nochchiyagama. A building for A/L students of Dunupothagama Maha Vidyalaya was constructed under the sub project 'Sip Sewana'. Additionally, the school's computer lab was also revamped with new computers and furniture. Maths, Science and English seminars for the area's O/L students were conducted under the 'Intellect' and 'Inspirer' programs while children of the locality got to participate in an astronomy camp under the sub project 'Star

Seekers'. Yet again, the 'Healing Hands' health camp was organized at Dunupothagama as well.



'Grama Prabodhaya' has been recognized in the global and local Rotaract arena for its eminent service towards comprehensive development of communities. In 2017, surpassing projects carried out by over 8,000 Rotaract clubs in 167 countries worldwide, the project was awarded the "International Single Club -Most Outstanding Project" award by the Rotary International. This was the first time a Sri Lankan Rotaract club was able to win the prestigious award and proved to be a historical achievement for the Rotaractors at Rotaract Mora.

ZOOXANTHELLAE

Rotaract Outstanding Project Awards - South Asia Regional Winner – 2018/2019

Coral bleaching has increased in a considerable amount over the past years due to destructive human activities as well as various environmental conditions. The mechanism by which corals regain their symbiotic algae probably varies among species. It may occur through uptake of new Zooxanthellae from the water column, although the most likely process is the multiplication of surviving Zooxanthellae that remain in the bleached coral tissues at very low levels. Project 'Zooxanthellae' is an attempt to protect these valuable species by designing and depositing steel structures into the sea with live corals attached, which will provide a base for the corals to grow. Due to that, there would certainly be a visible increase in growth and reproduction of corals.



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Thus, Zooxanthellae is an artificial coral reef building project, proposed during the Rotaract year 2016/17 by Professor Nalin Ratnayake and Rtr. Sahan Jayawardana with the timely purpose of providing necessary provisions for the sustenance of coral reefs. It need not be emphasized that the coral reefs have a great impact on the protection of coastline and marine lives. Yet, due to the rapid pursuit of development, people have forgotten to fulfill their share for the protection and sustenance of this priceless and rare natural resource.

Therefore, as a responsible organization, Rotaract Club of University of Moratuwa decided to support the growth of coral reefs by initiating the project Zooxanthellae.

With the aforementioned objective in mind, the project 'Zooxanthellae' was implemented in the Rotaract year 2017/18 and was then conducted continuously for 2 years, by which, the expected outcomes of this worthy exercise have gradually been achieved. The Rotaract year 2017/18 was dedicated to obtaining the permission for the deposition and the Rotaract year 2018/19 can be defined as the most critical year for Zooxanthellae, where the final deposition of the steel structures was carried out. Following several surveys, which were conducted with the help of the National Aquatic Resources Research & Development Agency, the coastline of Rumassala was chosen as the place satisfactory for coral growth.



Some entities were partnered up with Rotaract Mora, being a huge strength throughout this massive journ -ey. Namely they are, the Siam City Cement Lanka Ltd, Sri Lanka Navy, Ministry of Defense, National Aquatic Resources Research & Development Agency, Marine Environment Protection Authority, Department of Co--ast Conservation, Department of Wildlife Conservati--on and Department of Earth Resources Engineering University of Moratuwa. With the immense support of these units, this two-year-long journey reached its pin nacle on the Final Deposition Day on which the steel structures were deposited by the navy divers.



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Moreover, some awareness sessions were also conducted in parallel to this project to apprise the local community about the significance of Marine Ecosystems and to make them aware that conserving the coral reefs is not the one and only benefit to the community through this project. Public Relations campaigns and beach cleaning were part of the awareness programs. Through these, the Rotaractors acquired the chance of learning about the importance and the existence of corals. At the same time, they were able to grab the attention of the general public and to start discussions about this issue, which will lead Sri Lanka to an environmentally friendly country.

Fulfilling the dreams of many who strived to make Zooxanthellae a reality, the project was completed successfully in the Rotaract year 2018/19, driving the years of hard work and commitment into a triumphant conclusion. Further it was adjudged as the 'South Asia Regional Winner' in the 2018/19 Rotaract Outstanding Project Awards that was organized by Rotary International. However, the journey "Zooxanthellae" hasn't been seen to the end yet as Rotaract Mora has already decided to continue the same process in the Trincomalee coastal belt as well, extending the benefaction further afield.

ROTARACT MORA DIGITAL ODYSSEY PRESENCE

Rotaract Mora conducts an extensive amount of service through its platform towards creating brighter tomorrows for communities, and promoting the sustenance and rehabilitation of the environment. Each year, over 50 projects are implemented by the club in this regard across the four main avenues. As an institution bound to service, it is imperative that the club advocates the importance of volunteering towards the betterment of people and the planet by spreading the message of the work carried out by the club.

In hopes of providing an outlet for fellowship appreciation and awareness creation, the club has resorted to using various social media platforms to spread word and broaden its reach beyond its recipient communities and the walls of its bearing university. The club's traverse of the interweb has led to a following dispersed across 87 countries as at present.

The official Facebook page of Rotaract Club of University of Moratuwa has garnered a whopping 622,100+ likes while its official Instagram account has reached an impressive 131,000+ followers worldwide. The club's official Twitter account has an ongoing audience of 830+ followers. Frequent updates on club projects are posted on these platforms.



The official page of Rotaract Club of the University of Moratuwa on LinkedIn was rebranded in October 2019. Thus far, it has reached 540 followers.

The official club website was revamped at the beginning of the Rotaract year, to improve its user friendliness to the modern user and optimize the site experience of mobile users. The new interface enables a user to easily navigate through the site for more information about the signature projects, organized by the club.

The official club blog holds a variety of content ranging from articles in retrospect of completed projects to featured stories on making positive and impactful changes in the world. Through its recent update, readers are now able to navigate content related to projects, by avenue, with more ease. The frequency of featuring articles on topics worthy of social dialogue on the blog has also been increased over the year and the blog is now open to publishing works of poetry of talented members as well.

The team holding fort on the tech front for the club works tirelessly towards digitalizing various internal procedures of the club for the convenience of club members in project implementation.

One such endeavor has been the 'Are You Ready?' Web Portal through which the previously manual project processes under the club's signature Professional Development project, 'Are You Ready?', such as undergraduate and company registration, and online CV collection and sorting were fully automated.

The newest addition to the club's digitizing revolution will be 'LinkR', a digital membership management application allowing computerized attendance tracking during projects and online project task bidding, which is due to be launched in the near future.

THE HISTORY OF ROTARACT

On the 23rd of February 1905, in Chicago, attorney Paul P. Harris gathered three of his clients with the hopes of initiating a club of fellowship and friendship, exclusively for professionals. Since their meetings were scheduled on a rotational basis at the members' offices, they decided to name their club "Rotary". Within the short time, their association gained increasing local popularity and the first Rotary Club was inaugurated in Chicago. Soon Rotary gained popularity all over the world and the club was renamed "Rotary International". Being the world's first service club, Rotary continues to bring together global professionals and leaders under a humanitarian umbrella and strives to ensure world peace and harmony.



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Rotary, by initiating Interact Clubs, was also quick to harness the potential inside schools for the betterment of the society while simultaneously training the young minds to become future torchbearers by providing them this platform to showcase their talents. Although many youth service clubs were sponsored by Rotary, school graduates and university majors were not yet officially under the Rotary banner. Many of them were requesting for an extension of their Interact memberships and various proposals were put forth on this matter. However, on the 13th of March 1968, Rotary announced a new program, "Rotaract", for the young adults eager to contribute their part in the world. The name stands for "Rotary in Action" reflecting the red-hot energy, potential and passion that still continues to propel the fraternity of Rotaract forward.

Within a very short time, Rotaract gained popularity and spread beyond boundaries, reaching as far as India. Thus, subsequently in 1969 the establishment of Rotaract Club of Colombo marked the dawn of Rotaract's voyage in Sri Lanka. Fast forwarding to 1981, Rotaract had gained so much momentum that Rotaractors of South Africa took the initiative in assembling Rotaractors on global scale under INTEROTA. This triennial tradition has been carried forward and the upcoming one has been scheduled in Hong Kong. International meetings for Rotaractors are also held every year at the Rotaract Preconvention Meeting that precedes Rotary's annual convention. The first such meeting was held in Seoul, Korea, in 1989, with more than 450 Rotaractors in attendance.





A few years down the line, in March 1992, the RI Board established World Rotaract Week, which is celebrated annually during the week of 13th March to commemorate the chartering of the first Rotaract club in 1968. During World Rotaract Week, Rotaractors attend meetings with their sponsoring Rotary clubs, undertake joint service projects, and celebrate the accomplishments Rotaract has achieved as a program.

Throughout its lifetime of 52 years, Rotaract has strived and succeeded in serving the community and environment at large. Various projects such as health camps, educational programs, environmental programs and such are being conducted on various scales. One instance would be the fund collection campaign for PolioPlus, devised by the Rotaract Clubs of Heemstede and Hillegom-Lisse, that raised \$210,000 whilst also securing a spot in The Guinness Book of Records (1987). Countless people have benefitted and there is no doubt that their prayers render support in driving the organization forward.

Meanwhile, Rotaract hasn't neglected the professional and social development of its members. Webinars, career fairs, training sessions and various other programs provide the young Rotaractors with a corporate exposure while Rotaract-to-Rotaract collaborations, social meetups and such, provide them with an opportunity to bond with one another and expand their network.

Thus, in 2020, Rotaract has been announced to be promoted to membership status on par with its current parent body, Rotary. 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
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
